I am going to put you in a different discipleship group, but don't get mad! I will make sure your leader will study the Bible with you each week. Ivanildo is walking around the soccer field and Marabá campus in September with a clipboard and pencil. Teen-agers are becoming bible study leaders, knowing just a little more than the small groups they are teaching. Later over 100 youths participate in the Saturday night church service. Sunday morning about 15 young people show up for a three-hour leadership class. Sunday night is our main weekly service. There were about 150 people in attendance.

When I saw all these little meetings going on, and watched how Ivanildo and Monica were trying to model living as a Christian family I thought, *This is going to work out OK*.

I remember when Ivanildo showed up in Altamira at our Monday Night Men's Group bible study, *Please pray for me. I am a bartender at the army base. My marriage is really in trouble.* Before this he was in the special forces and before that he broke wild horses on his dad's ranch.

Now it is hard to imagine he has not been a Christian all his life. It is such a pleasure planting the Marabá church and regional center together. We ordained Ivanildo and Monica as Senior Pastors in the beginning of this year, 2011.

This summer Ivanildo and Monica were able to bring a team of 27 young leaders from Marabá back to their sending church in Altamira. This involved a 27 hour bus ride over very treacherous roads. Elba, the

## **Disparity**

I had the opportunity to travel along the river with one of my pastor friends. We visited a river community, a small village of four families, all extended family. We were supposed to meet some other people along the river but as night was setting in, we found ourselves in front of this village and stopped to ask if they would allow us to sleep there for the night. We introduced ourselves and talked about our plans for the next couple of days. We asked if we

could share our food with them. So, that evening we had fish, rice and farinha, a bran-oat like staple made from the manioc plant. I wondered what they would have eaten had we not showed up. We stayed there for a couple of nights, making some new friends and fishing together. Here is one of the things that stood out to me on this trip. These people in the village were dirt poor. They had very little income. There was around \$600/ month for the 18 people in the extended families or barely a dollar per day. They hunt, they fish, they grow crops. Medicine,

school supplies, clothing, other non-producible goods like cooking oil, were all extremely scarce. While none of them were starving, they did not have proper clothing or even rice for their families. It is tough to get filled up on fish and farinha. One of the biggest difficulties in reaching the Amazon region with the Gospel of God's Kingdom is confronting the poverty that is rampant in the region. It creates real barriers to spreading God's word that need to be overcome. While the Amazon region is filled with an amazing and bountiful beauty of creation, it often can overwhelm the stark reality of the poverty that is rampant in the region. One uncomfortable truth for many in the American church is that we are isolated from the reality of poverty, both within our own country and even more so from around the world. We need to consider the Scriptural imperative of reaching out to the poor and marginalized and consider seriously the use of our resources as we live our lives in light of eternity. "And they asked, that as part of our responsibility as representatives of Christ, that we remember the poor, in our time, effort, and giving. This was exactly what we wanted to do from the depths of our hearts." Galatians 2:10, paraphrase. Bud Simon
