This is the beginning of a new generation, one that will have a new story, one with families that are whole, who love God, and each other. The cycle of brokenness is changing. God is redeeming lives, changing stories and giving a future to our neighbors.

I personally have made so many friends just from being a teacher. The school is a way to form a bridge between two very different cultures, helping us find common ground.

One of our highest priorities as we move forward in Portel is to build a small building which will be used for both our classroom and

to hold church services in the beginning. Richie and his team have succeeded in laying the foundation for the building.
