
## Ladies Ministries by Christie Bouthillier

# The Kubacki Family Look to Angola

I remember meeting Tim, Betsy and the kids in Belem to help them register with the Federal Police upon arrival. Their kids were just that - kids. Hard to believe it was the same family standing at the dock in Porto de Moz awaiting the barge for Belem. Luke is now a man getting ready to start University and Ben dwarfs me. Ellie and Meredith are both young ladies now. It has been more than five years since they came to the Xingu, yet the impact they have made in those five years will last an eternity. Rarely did Tim miss an opportunity to be on the river and serve the poor, while Betsy coordinated teams and ran the office. As the barge pulled away there was not a dry eye in the crowd. Almost daily people tell me how the Kubacki's touched their lives in one way or another, my family included. For the last year the Kubackis have felt their heart strings being tugged towards Angola. While being based in a city and being able to train nationals at a hospital, Tim will be making frequent trips to the remote

people groups of the region. Many of

these groups have not been met with the gospel and have no Christian witness. #### **ETHOS**

This year we are really excited to partner with the ETHOS program from the University of Dayton. ETHOS stands for Engineers in Technical Humanitarian Opportunities of Service Learning. Each year, ETHOS sends engineering students on a mission to various locations across the globe. ETHOS students endeavor to apply and implement technologies in a local context. Michael and Phil arrived in Porto de Moz roughly a month ago. Within days of arriving they were able to begin building a solar oven while planning out a strategy for building solar panels. Last week they were able to take their solar cooker on a tour, visiting a couple communities on the Xingu River. After a little bit of spearfishing, the solar oven cooked a couple of Peacock Bass exquisitely. It was fun to watch the response of the locals. Comments varied, but most

were surprised by the heat generated and many wanted to know how they can get their hands on one. Many families on the river still cook with wood and charcoal, while some of the more privileged use propane. The solar cooker seems like it may be a viable option for saving money while it is also environmentally friendly. These last several weeks we began building solar panels together with Dr. Komp from Maine Solar. We are particularly interested in working towards the development of a cottage industry to help support Pastors and leaders who work in rural areas. This project should prove to be a great opportunity to improve the lives of people who live in rural areas while at the same time utilizing a renewable resource. As we grow up as a base it is important that we not only develop regional leadership but also help develop strategies to see these leaders empowered in a way that they can effectively live amongst their peers in remote areas.

Just before Christmas last year our office was robbed and the thieves made off with a significant amount of money that put our project in a difficult place. At the eleventh

hour when it seemed we would need to close things down, the Lord provided.
