We will soon be wrapping up the first semester of CDR Marajó English classes here in Portel, and it comes with a great sense of accomplishment. When I (Allison Rupert) first came to Brazil almost 3 years ago, I

had no idea that I would one day be starting an English school. But during that time, God made it very clear that is what he wanted me to do. This past semester has been a confirmation of that calling as God's presence has been with us every step of the way.

Before we opened the school in February, we were not sure where the classes would be held as our building was nowhere near completion. We ended up finding a local university that was willing to rent us a room. The rent is not too expensive, and the room is perfect for our needs.

In the beginning, there were a lot of students who quit, which was disappointing, but those who stayed excelled and really began to bond together as a group. We had the privilege of having a children's teacher come all the way from Altamira to live here for 4 months. Her name is Manoela, and the kids just loved her. Her class was by far the most successful. Almost none of the students quit, and many of

them scored very high grades at the end. I have also had the help of a local teacher named Fabrício. Fabrício speaks excellent English and has years of teaching experience. I could not have done this past semester without him! He will be teaching the introductory level course by himself next semester.

I have already started signing up students for the next semester that begins in August, and there has been a lot of interest. With the more time we spend here, the more we become established as a reliable presence in the city. Our integrity can have a huge impact on the city, as people are used to schools specialized schools coming and going with little regard of their effect on those they leave behind. Showing Christ-like character in our business relations draws them closer to Christ himself.

One of the benefits of opening the school is that it also opens the door to relationships. I have invited several of my students to a home group I have at my house every Saturday. It has been a great privilege to not only help them grow in their futures, but also in their spiritual lives.
